COMMON QUESTIONS

1. What can I expect at the workshops? Regardless of the format you choose, you will learn about Clinton County's challenges and opportunities and generate essential insight on community goals, values, principles and more. In light of COVID-19, masks and social distancing will be required for in-person events.

2. Where are the in-person meetings taking place? In-person meetings will be held outside in shelters and take place rain or shine. On 5/13 meetings will take place at Denver Park's three main shelter houses in Wilmington. On 5/20 the meeting will take place in the Dance Pavilion at Cowan Lake State Park. Use the park entrance on Yankee Road off St Rt 350 and follow signs for the Dance Pavilion.

3. What is a comprehensive plan? A comprehensive plan is a long-term guide that expresses the values and aspirations of a community. It is the broadest public policy document a community can create for its future physical development that considers the input of community members.

4. Why does Clinton County need to update the comprehensive plan? The existing comprehensive plan was adopted in 2004 and needs to be updated to reflect current trends and priorities. In general, planning represents good stewardship, and there has never been a better time to consider recent events and trends to develop well-supported policies to create the best possible future for the County.

5. Will there be other opportunities for residents to get involved? Yes! Anybody who cares about the future of Clinton County will be able to participate and contribute their ideas and insight.

6. Do I have to be an expert to contribute ideas? Absolutely not! By living, working, attending school or raising a family in Clinton County, you are knowledgeable about the community. Whether you are a new or life-long resident, your perspective is vital to the plan's success.
